GCSE Literature and Language

Structure of the Examination: Language

2 Papers

Paper 1: Explorations in Creative Writing

1 hour 45 minutes

1 hour: Reading Section (1 piece of narrative fiction)


45 minutes: Writing Section (narrative or description)

Paper 2: Writers' Viewpoints and Perspectives


1 hour 45 minutes

1 hour: Reading Section (2 pieces of non-fiction)

45 minutes: Writing Section (non-fiction)

Revision tips for writing

Paper 1

- Read short stories all the past papers are examples
- Vocabulary ambitious but used effectively and correctly
- Think about structure e.g.
 Drop, Shift, Zoom In, Zoom
 Out
- Plan!

Paper 2

- Buy a weekend broadsheet newspaper and find one or two articles on a topic that you are interested in
- Think about perspectives 'who' could I write in the voice of, and why?
- Rhetorical devices (e.g. repetition, power of three) – how and why
- Plan!

Supporting Your Child with English: Reading

The average reading age required for the extracts given for GCSE Language are 17 (one year above where students are when they are sitting the examination).

Therefore, reading is a really vital skill.

Encouraging your child to regularly read fiction and non-fiction is one way in which you will encourage them to increase their reading pace and fluency.

Some tips for Encouraging Reluctant Readers:

- Short stories (available in the Library)
- Non-fiction (facts/history books/magazines)

English Language: Viewpoints and Perspectives

Paper 2 Language is called 'viewpoints and perspectives'. In this paper, students are expected to identify the viewpoints and explore what the author thinks about a certain topic.

Let's practise and discuss what students would have to do:

What are the viewpoints and perspectives of this article?

How do you know through the language used?

Structure of the Examination: Literature

Literature Paper 1- 'Macbeth' and 'Jekyll and Hyde' (1 hour and 45 mins)

Literature Paper 2- 'An Inspector Calls', 'Power and Conflict Poetry' and 'Unseen Poetry' (2 hours and 15 mins)

Students do not have access to texts in any of these examinations. Therefore, it is vital that your child has a good knowledge of quotations from the texts. It is never too early to start learning these quotations and I would urge you be testing your child on quotations from the text.

The more quotes that students know, the more confident they feel with the texts that they are studying; the better their responses.



Some of our students love annotating and annotations, however, sometimes they can become overwhelmed by this and put off revision because of it.


They simply need to break it down:
